Questions and NCDP Reply

1. How extensive is the renovation project that is being contemplated? Do you intend to do internal structural work or external or both? What is the range of total anticipated costs and how much fundraising is deemed necessary? What is the official historical designation status of the current party headquarters.

A. The renovation will be extensive requiring external and interior work of both a structural and cosmetic nature. The anticipated cost of

the project is \$1.5 million to \$2.5 million necessitating a full-time fundraising effort. The Party Headquarters is housed in a building it owns, The Goodwin House, built in 1903 and designated as a Raleigh Historic Site in 1980.

2. Please define the term "construction management" and provide examples of what it would include. Please state if it possible that any portion of the costs might be incurred prior to the actually beginning of construction or might be incurred even if the building plan was abandoned.

A. A Construction Manager would be the equivalent of a General Contractor -- an individual or firm that, while not actually doing any of the actual renovation work, would oversee and manage the work of the various subcontractors involved in the renovation project.
