

## Dear Office of General Counsel:

We write in support of allowing text message campaign contributions and hope the FEC will quickly approve the proposal to allow this practice.

In a post-Citizens United era in which billionaires and special interest Super PACs increasingly dominate our political discourse, we must find ways to enhance the role of small donors. While secretive Super PAC spending by a few billionaires can dissuade people from participating in our democracy, small donors are an integral part of our democracy, and amplifying their voices can help more everyday Americans get involved in the democracy process. Our current ampaign finance system was designed in an era befine significant technological advances were made, and we should fully use existing technology to encure that as many people as possible can participate in our democracy.

A recent Pew study revealed that at least 30 million Americans have texted a contribution to a charitable cause, and many individuals would likely send a campaign contribution via text message if this concept were enacted. Several jurisdictions (California and Maryland) have already begun to implement this practice legislatively or administratively at the state and local level. While we support legislative means to allow text mossage campaign contributions at the federal level, we see the FEC as being best positioned to allow this practice.

Many organizations, including Public Campaign, the Campaign Legal Centar, Citizens for Ruspensibility and Ethics in Washington (CREW), Communications Workers of America (CWA), Democracy Matters, Demos, Public Citizen, Rootstrikers, United Republic, and U.S. PIRG, support the concept of allowing text message campaign contributions as a way to get more people involved in the democratic process.

We encourage you to allow campaign contributions via text message, and we thank you for considering our views.
